Foremost on my mind right now is that the Bishop Search Committee is entering an important new phase. January we made the first cut of nominees and I'll once again echo the words of our committee's chairperson when she said all the members of the committee are really excited about the "breadth and depth" of the nominees.

The first cut was difficult enough, but in Feb we have the committee broken down into smaller groups that will individually conduct and record Skype interviews with the nominees. All committee members have to review all the interviews before our next meeting near the end of Feb. At that meeting we will make another cut down to a smaller group of nominees who the committee will meet with in April (to make our final cut down to a 3-5 person slate of candidates).

Aside from the exciting work of the Search Committee, February also means - Shrove Tuesday, Ash Wednesday and Lent are here!



THE SEASON OF EPIPHANY

Perhaps the most persistent of human dreams is that we are not alone in the universe. We hope that life and what happens to us are not all an accident to which the rest of the universe is indifferent. In modern dress, responses to this yearning sometimes take the form of stories about visitors from outer space or the sighting of unidentified flying objects. In every age, versions of astrology have offered the comfort that there is some design. By sign and story the readings of the Epiphany season tell of God's way of salvation and its outreach beyond Judaism to all peoples. Light and revelation transform darkness, fear, and uncertainty. Christians are called to respond by proclaiming "the boundless riches of Christ" and by becoming missionaries of this message of light. But their first response is more simply awe, joy, and then the worshipful bringing of gifts along with the Magi.

The readings of the Epiphany season emphasize what God has done in and through Jesus. The star shines and we rejoice in stories of his nativity and baptism. He is God's beloved and chosen one to bring the forgiveness of sins and "light to the Gentiles." We hear stories of his teaching, miracles, and acts of healing. As the prophets foretold, we learn who he is, and we come at the end of the season of Epiphany (that means literally "shining upon") to glimpse his transfiguration in glory. He is "the light of the world" who causes the heart to "thrill and rejoice" and brings "exceeding great joy," and new "boldness and confidence" in the relationship with God and all creation.

FROM VESTRY MEETING JANUARY 17TH

- 1. Voted to make contributions to Episcopal Relief & Development, Friends of Rogers and Afton Glenwood Cemetery.
- 2. Received a thank you from Bishop Adam's wife Bonnie for contribution made towards expenses of the Mission of Miracles project with San Salvador. Letters have been received from San Salvador children thanking St. Ann's for items collected for that project. These have been translated and will be reviewed by the district young people.
- 3. Our old copier has been donated to Charles Decker for use by the Afton Historical Society.
- 4. A pancake supper will be held at St. Paul's on February 9th. Shrove Tuesday.
- 5. St. Ann's Lenten soup and video program begins February 17th. eat at 5:30 p.m. and program at 6.
- 6. St. Ann's will host the Easter Sunrise Service this year with breakfast to follow.
- The importance of selecting our convention delegates was noted in a letter received from the search committee. These delegates will attend convention November 18 & 19 and also vote for a new Bishop August 6th.
- 8. Fr. David would like to have the three vestries, Zion, St. Paul's and St. Ann's get together at a central location to discuss where we are and where we are going.
- 9. Treasurer reported that we are solvent and thanked everyone for their continued support of St. Ann's financial needs.

A MESSAGE FROM THE BISHOP TRANSITION COMMITTEE OF CNY

Because of its origins, the Episcopal Church is considered apostolic, as its bishops can be traced back to the original apostles via holy orders. The word "episcopal" refers to government by bishops. The historic episcopate (bishop) continues the work of the first apostles in the Church: guarding the faith, unity and discipline of the Church, and ordaining men and women to continue Christ's ministry. Bishops are also chief priests and pastors and, by their devotion to the people of their jurisdictions, rightly influence the spiritual character of their dioceses.

Bishops in the Episcopal Church are elected by clergy and lay delegates who represent all the people of a diocese. And so it is that, during this particular year, a new bishop will be selected to lead the people of this diocese, from Utica to Waterloo, from the St. Lawrence River to the Pennsylvania frontier. The process for the election of a bishop is not complicated but it is specific so following the plan and schedule is important. Ponder, for example, the wise maidens in Matthew's Gospel, who, unlike their foolish companions, were prepared when the time came. They had not lost sight of the plan and we have the advantage of knowing the schedule!

Parishes need to prepare for the upcoming election. Of course, all required paperwork needs to be kept upto-date, but the focus of this letter is to remind you that Delegates to Convention need to be chosen promptly! *The Delegates from your parish will actually be attending two conventions: the special Electing Convention on August 6th, and the annual Diocesan Convention on November 11th & 12th* and they must be elected by early May. Ms. Debbie Nettle will be sending forms for Delegate certification by mid-April. To be wise and not foolish, you should be prepared to return the forms without delay, so that your parish will be represented at both Conventions, and have a voice in this historic election.

The Final Word



This is a reprise of a commentary that was written for the Feb 2010 issue.

Just as they were leaving, Peter said to Jesus, "Master, it is good for us to be here; let us make three dwellings, one for you, one for Moses, and one for Elijah" — not knowing what he said. Luke 9:33 Peter's and his companions are on a mountain with Jesus and they drift off to sleep while he is praying. Then they are awakened when Jesus is transfigured. It is interesting to read of Peter's first response when he wakes up and sees the changed Jesus along with Moses and Elijah. He wants to build a dwelling for each of them. Think about it. Isn't that often what we try to do with God? Put Him in a dwelling (or what some would call a box?) It's a natural thing to do. Our minds have a difficult time conceptualizing an entity that always was and always will be, that is all powerful, all knowing and yet loves and knows each of us individually. So it is only natural that we think of God in our image instead of the other way around. Unfortunately, this limits our relationship with God and we forget that with God all things are possible. Instead, we live in anxiety when prayer could bring us peace. We feel lonely even though God is always with us. We are fearful when faith could calm our trembling. We wallow in despair when God offers us joy. God has made us joint heirs with Christ. He offers us innumerable blessings and promises, promises that are exceedingly great and precious. Grab them. Claim them for your life. Don't limit God. The Lord of the impossible is waiting for you to call on His name. Will you call on Him now?


