Now that St Peter's has a regular pastor that lives nearby (not to mention a friend of mine!), we've been trying to do more activities together. So far, while I've been focusing on teaching Confirmation classes this Lent, Pastor Becky has been leading our Wednesday night Lenten series.

I know lots of us have wonderful God-moments when we're out in nature, but I'm convinced that it's only when we're worshiping and working together to further God's kingdom, only then do we truly have Jesus-moments. I want to begin raising awareness about something I find really exciting. VESTRY HIGHLIGHTS



March 19, 2017

1. **Outreach:** Discussed El Salvador project. Two St. Ann's parishioners are planning to participate in the "Habitat for Humanity" field trip. Vestry decided to support them financially as part of our outreach efforts. Also voted to make a contribution to the Afton Presbyterian Church "A place at the table," lunch project.
2. **Possible purchase of an electronic projector:** Discussed having available for Church use and for organizations that use St. Ann's Parish Hall. Decided to try one and see how well it works in the Parish Hall and then decide where we would like to go from there. This will be done April 2nd.
3. **May Breakfast:** Will be hosted by St. Ann's on May 5th. with a program on hop growing in New York State.
4. **Fay & Barbara Todd bequest:** The final payment has been received. It has been decided to "tith" these funds to help those less fortunate than St. Ann's. St. Ann's children reviewed the Episcopal Relief and Development information on what animals could be purchased to help others and made several choices. A final decision on donations will be made shortly.
5. **Also discussed the investment of the remainder of the Todd bequest for the benefit of the Parish.** A final decision to be made next month.
6. **Holy Week Services:** Maundy Thursday, 7:00pm at St. Ann's, Good Friday, 7:00pm at St. Ann's, Easter Vigil, Saturday at 8:00pm at St. Peter's, Easter Sunrise at 6:30am at North Afton Methodist Church, Easter service at St. Ann's will be at 9:00am. Note the time change.
7. **Fr. Ralph Groskoph will be with us for the Palm Sunday service, at 9:15AM.**
8. **Girl Scout Sunday:** A picture and short write up has been put in the Messenger.
9. **Possible "facebook" account:** Deacon Kay is checking with the communications specialist for the Diocese to get more information. Perhaps a "facebook" for the entire District.
10. **St. Ann's Scholarship for an "exceptional student" at Afton Central School:** Decided to continue with this scholarship, increasing the amount to \$300.
11. **Update of carpet:** There have been some suggestions that this be considered. Vestry asked to think about this and will be discussed next month.
12. **Treasurer's report:** Treasurer commented on several items of the report, including clergy expense. We are still "in the black."

A smiling Jesus story

Peter asked: "But what about all the suffering, the hate and the destruction we've seen?" Jesus raised his hands to the heavens and prayed aloud: "Father, they do not see your gifts in the world. Yes, there is suffering and it pains my heart. But I can still see the beauty in nature and in mankind. I know from it that you love us so much."

The disciples around the campfire began to feel guilty as they looked at one another. But then slowly each began to laugh until it sounded like a loud roar. Jesus asked: "Do you not feel better now?" And again Jesus was deeply troubled. Then they came to the grave. It was a cave with a stone rolled across the entrance "Roll the stone aside," Jesus told them. But Martha, the dead man's sister, said, "Lord, by now the smell will be terrible because he has been dead for four days." Jesus responded, "Didn't I tell you that you will see God's glory if you believe?" So they rolled the stone aside. Then Jesus looked up to heaven and said, Father, thank you for hearing me. You always hear me, but I said it out loud for the sake of all these people standing here, so they will believe you sent me." Then Jesus shouted, "Lazarus come out! John 11: 38-44

The story of Lazarus's death and resurrection contains a profound teaching about sorrow. When Jesus arrived and was taken to the graveside, he wept openly. Onlookers were impressed with the power of his grief and immediately recognized it as an indicator of his great love. "See how much he loved him," they said. The tears Jesus shed that day forever validate the experience of human sorrow and grief. Even though we have the hope of resurrection and we know that for the believer physical death is not the final word, our tears and sorrow are appropriate and good. How comforting to know that God himself is willing to walk the way of sorrow with us! Is there any sorrow that you have been unable to express fully? You can share it with the Lord, for he understands your grief fully.
