From Fr. Dave

It's natural enough for folks to look to their pastor for the right words at the right time. My hope as a pastor is that I can learn the Prayer Book well enough to be able to share the healing words it has accumulated through centuries of use.

As we begin another season of Lent, let's consider the words that have been given to us from our Prayer Book's Ash Wednesday service:

"Dear People of God: The first Christians observed with great devotion the days of our Lord's passion and resurrection, and it became custom of the Church to prepare for them by a season of penitence and fasting. This season of Lent provided a time in which converts to the faith were prepared for Holy Baptism. It was also a time when those who, because of notorious sins, had been separated from the body of the faithful were reconciled by penitence and forgiveness, and restored to the fellowship of the Church. Thereby, the whole congregation was put to mind of the message of pardon and absolution set forth in the Gospel of our Savior, and of the need which all Christians continually have to renew their repentance and faith."

"I invite you, therefore, in the name of the Church, to the observance of a holy Lent, by self-examination and repentance; by prayer, fasting, and self-denial; and by reading and meditating on God's holy Word. "

More than just fine words, here we are invited by the distilled wisdom from the earliest ages of Christianity to share in the continuous, on-going life of Christ.

### Our Sacred Trust

Not too long ago, most parents trusted that the values and ethics for leading “the good life” were clear to their children. They trusted that church and society were in basic agreement about morality. They trusted that young people would learn the most important lessons through the cooperative moral agreement that appeared to be a part of a broad social contract. They trusted that the details of denominational belief could be learned at Sunday school, and that the full engagement of life would bring about formation of the soul.

Today, many act as if the same arrangement exists. The connection between what our young people learn from surrounding culture and what they learn from the gospel has changed. The work of God is always alive and active in the world, but the capacity to discern it has faded to an all-time low, not just in our society but also in the church. We have to ask ourselves: in our hyper-connected, media-dominated culture, how will the soul be formed? What will it look like?

**One of our responsibilities to God is to pass on knowledge of the sacred. Though faith is a path that each of us must choose individually, it is a sacred communal trust that must be renewed by every generation. It is an essential aspect of the command and gift we call love.**

**When Jesus called Peter to the task of sharing his faith, to live for others, he asked, “Do you love me?” Like Peter, we may be surprised to find our responsibilities to others begin with intense self-evaluation. Do you love Jesus? Do you love God? What is truly important to you? What is your ultimate commitment.**

**The society in which we now live demands a renewed commitment to the sacred trust that compels us to share our spiritual knowledge and traditions with each other and with the generations to come. This is clearly one of our most urgent tasks as a community. It begins by a fearless searching of our individual hearts.**

## FEBRUARY VESTRY MEETING HIGHLIGHTS

1. **Outreach:** Voted to send \$200 to the Afton Interchurch Council for the benefit of the Afton School “backpack” program.
2. **Old Business:** Bible study will start March 8<sup>th</sup>. to be held this year at St. Peter’s, Bainbridge. Stations of the cross at 5:30, soup & sandwich at 6:00, bible study at 6:30.
3. **New business:** Robin and Brianna Felldin are considering going to El Salvador with the Mission of Miracles program of the Diocese. Possibly Denise Wieber as well. If one or all of these individuals make the trip, it was decided to subsidize their expenses with the funds that are currently in the Youth Group account. This program helps people in El Salvador with health and wellness issues. **Additional financial contributions are welcomed and may be sent to St. Ann’s marked “El Salvador project.”**
4. Voted to continue our membership in the Afton Chamber of Commerce and also to support the chamber financially by purchasing an ad in their new brochure.
5. Chris and Yan Vail thanked for providing the music on February 5<sup>th</sup>.
6. Discussed what St. Ann’s might do to support the “war against addiction” that is going on in the area. It was suggested that we ask Logan Tallmadge to speak at a coffee hour about her work with victims of addiction. Also to ask Dan Vail to speak about the addiction situation in the Binghamton area. The date of May 21st. was tentatively selected.
7. **Treasurer’s report:** We are operating “in the black.” The parochial report is nearly completed and will be done before the March 1<sup>st</sup>. deadline. The final report for 2016 for Fr. David’s salary and expenses and our share paid. Estimated payments will be made to Zion Church, Greene, and any differences adjusted on a quarterly basis. The final payment from the Fay Todd Estate should be received in the next 30 days.

**The Final Word**

*Let not sin control the way you live; do not give in to its lustful desires. Do not let any part of your body become a tool of wickedness, to be used for sinning. Instead, give yourselves completely to God since you have been given new life. And use your whole body as a tool to do what is right for the glory of God.* Romans 6:12-13

This month, specifically March 1st, we begin our observance of Lent, traditionally a season of penitence and fasting. An Exhortation in our Book of Common Prayer contains the following directive that would serve us well as a Lenten discipline. “Examine your lives and conduct by the rule of God’s commandments, that you may perceive wherein you have offended in what you have done or left undone, whether in thought, word, or deed. And acknowledge your sins before almighty God, with full purpose of amendment of life, being ready to make restitution for all injuries and wrongs done by you to others; and also being ready to forgive those who have offended you, in order that you yourselves may be forgiven.” Having recognized our sin and being assured of forgiveness, what remains is for us to repent and amend our life so that we become, as St. Paul puts it in his letter to the Romans, “a tool to do what is right for the glory of God.” As we observe Lent and the awesome event to which it is leading us, let us ask ourselves the following question. Is there something I have or something I’m doing (or not doing) that is keeping me from giving or accepting the love of God and others?

May God grant us the grace to ask that question and to act upon the answer. PCV
