Hey folks! After hearing about Tom T. Hall's passing, I can't help but reflect upon what he's meant to my spiritual development. Some of you, no doubt, may be wondering who Tom T. Hall was. He was an American Country singer (Christian poet extraordinaire, in my opinion) who was particularly successful in the 70s. I've said before how I was never taken to church as a child. Well, thanks to Tom T. Hall, I was still able to learn about Jesus. Above and beyond just mentioning Jesus, though, he sang songs of simple goodness. His poetry wove wonderful images of life simply lived with care and concern for others. He presented life humbly and non-

judgmentally lived in all its multifaceted magnificence. So, I'd like to share some verses that helped my spiritual development and I hope you can find some value in reflecting upon them too:

From I Washed My Face In The Morning Dew – after a couple verses depicting towns in which residents don't care about a condemned criminal or a poor, crippled man, he reflects upon a town that is "settled, peaceful and nice". However, in this town, "The rich got richer, and the poor get poorer, and to me it didn't seem right." The final verse says, "Someday things are bound to change, it can't be very far. And each injustice I have seen with come before the bar. Then I'll wash my face in the morning dew, bathe my soul in the sun. Wash my face in the morning dew and my journey will be done."

There's so much more but let me also offer some verses from **One Hundred Children**. One hundred children sing a song "Don't blow up the world, don't kill all the flowers. Today this is your world, tomorrow it's ours. Leave us pure water and forests uncut. Think of tomorrow, leave something for us. Your god may be dead, but ours is alive. We think without him we cannot survive. Punish all the bad men, praise all the good. Talk to your neighbors about brotherhood."

Thanks be to God for the life, witness, poetry, and spiritual guidance from Tom T. Hall. The Holy Spirit continually offers God's love to us all.

The Final Word




