Why Do We Need Jesus?

You and I were created to live in a relationship with God. Until we find that relationship there will always be something missing in our lives. As a result, we are often aware of a gap. One rock singer describes it by saying: "I've got an emptiness deep inside." A woman once wrote me of "a deep deep, void." Another young girl spoke of "a chunk missing in her soul." People try to fill this emptiness in various ways. Some try to close the gap with money—but that does not satisfy. Aristotle Onassis, who was one of the richest men in the world, said at the end of his life, 'Millions do not always add up to what a man or woman need out of life." Others try drugs or excess alcohol or sexual promiscuity. One person said that "These things provide instant gratification, but they leave you feeling hollow afterwards." Still others try hard work, music, or sports, while others seek success. There may not be anything wrong with these in themselves, but they do not satisfy that hunger deep inside every human being.

Even the closest human relationships, wonderful though they are, do not in themselves satisfy this "emptiness deep inside." Nothing will fill this gap except the relationship with God for which we were made.

According to the New Testament, the reason for this emptiness is that men and women have turned their backs on God. Jesus said, "I am the bread of life." He is the only one who can satisfy our deepest hunger because He is the one who makes it possible for our relationship with God to be restored. He supplied the answers to our deepest needs.




