

As June draws to a close, a quote from Tom Stoppard's **Rosencrantz and Guildenstern are Dead** keeps coming to my mind - "Generally speaking, things have gone about as far as they can possibly go, when things have gotten about as bad as they can reasonably get."

Tragically, that only seems to hold true for literature. In reality, things can go horribly wrong and beyond all reasonableness. Scripture is filled with very bad things happening. CHURCH TERMS: JULY 22 – SAINT MARY MAGDALENE – A feast day commemorating one of our Lord's disciples who had richly received His grace. It is commemorated on July 22.

JULY 25 – JAMES THE ELDER – An Apostle and brother of John. The first of the disciples to be martyred and the only one whose death is recorded in the New Testament. Acts 12:1. With Peter and John, he was one of the inner circles of disciples closest to Jesus. His symbol is three shells, representing the journeys to undertook for the Lord. He is commemorated on July 25. Liturgical color: RED

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AUGUST 6 – THE TRANSFIGURATION OF OUR LORD JESUS CHRIST – The events that took place on the Mount of Transfiguration are commemorated on August 6. Mark 9:2-8. Liturgical color: white.

AUGUST 15 - SAINT MARY THE VIRGIN, MOTHER OF OUR LORD JESUS CHRIST

AUGUST 24 – SAINTS' DAY – St. Bartholomew

> Watch Your Words!! The Rev'd Mark H. Crumpler Grace Church, Bethlehem, PA.

Do not let any unwholesome talk come out of your mouths. (Ephesians 4:29)

Talking can be a problem. We have all uttered words that we wish we could get back. We have all said one thing but managed to convey something else. With our words we have been careless, thoughtless, and heartless. We have spoken when we should have kept our mouths shut. We have sat mute when we should have had the courage to speak up. Simply put, we've said things that we regret.

So, we have two extremes when it comes to our words and the things we say. On one hand, we could simply decide to stop talking. Period. On the other hand, you can throw your words around without really thinking about their impact, and then you can live your days feeling embarrassed about what you said. Or maybe there's a better way -- a way that truly reflects why our God, a speaking God, created us to be speaking beings, and why our speaking matters for our life together as followers of Jesus.

Our Guidelines for Talkers: Our words are possibly the single most effective way we can give encouragement to other people. And the simple gift of an encouraging word is a practical way for us to "love one another."

That's not the only way, of course. Sometimes people can be encouraged by your example. They watch the way you live, see the way you handle yourself and handle what life throws at you, and they are encouraged by what they see. Your example shows them what's possible. It gives them hope.

But there's an immediate impact, a game – changing power hidden within our words. Words allow you to provide encouragement by direct deposit. The things you say can go straight to another person's soul. The words you use can build them up, or just as easily tear them down.

In a single verse of Paul's Letter to the Ephesians we get a few simple guidelines for using our words in a way that will encourage others. We don't hide this gift by taking a vow of silence; we don't squander the gift by speaking without a filter. The guidelines are straightforward, and you can put them into practice today.

First, determine to build others up. Say something that will leave a person better off than they were before they encountered you. You don't have to be profound, just be positive.

Second, speak words that are fitting to where that person is and what they're dealing with in their life. Speak according to their needs. It's nice to tell someone that 'everything will be ok" – but there may be times when they can't hear that. So, say what fits the moment.

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Finally, let your words be beneficial to any who might hear them. Sometimes your words are not just heard, they are overheard. Make sure being overheard isn't a source of regret for you. The writer of *Ecclesiastes* was exactly right when he wrote that "there is a time to keep silence and a time to speak" Silence can be good for your soul, but speaking can be good for someone else's soul. Giving encouragement is at the heart of Christian community – and the best way to do this is with your words. How will you use words to encourage and build up someone today?

A Prayer: Lord, let my words be filled with your grace today. Help me to speak in such a way that those who hear are encouraged, and those who overhear are glad they did. I ask you to be at work in someone else's life through things that I say, speaking life into others just as Jesus did, the one through whom we pray. Amen


