YOUR CHURCH NEEDS YOU!!

DID I GET YOUR ATTENTION? I HOPE SO. BUT I ALSO HOPE THAT WHEN I SAY "CHURCH" YOU UNDERSTAND THAT AS MORE THAN JUST OUR INDIVIDUAL PARISHES. INDEED, BY SUPPORTING OUR INDIVIDUAL PARISHES, WE'RE ALSO SUPPORTING THE LARGER CHURCH, BUT THESE LAST COUPLE WEEKS I'VE BEEN SHOCKED TO FIND OUT THERE'S NO WHERE NEAR ENOUGH CLERGY TO SERVE THE CHURCH.

NOW, FOR AT LEAST A DECADE OR MORE CHURCH LEADERS HAVE BEEN WARNING ABOUT SHORTAGE OF PRIESTS. IN FACT, AROUND 2007 I FIRST BEGAN DISCERNING WHETHER TO BECOME A PRIEST AFTER MY HOME PRIEST PREACHED MORE THAN A FEW SERMONS ABOUT THE COMING SHORTAGE. IT TOOK A FEW MONTHS OF HIS SERMONS BEFORE THE IDEA TOOK ROOT IN MY HEART THAT I MIGHT BE ABLE TO SERVE THE CHURCH AS A PRIEST. TO BE SPECIFIC, THOUGH, I FOUND IT HEARTBREAKING TO IMAGINE PARISHES NOT BEING ABLE TO CELEBRATE COMMUNION.

UNTIL THAT POINT, I HAD ONLY EVER DONE READINGS AND LED A FEW MORNING PRAYER SERVICES. ON MY OWN I HAD LEARNED SOME THEOLOGY, BUT I HAD NO IDEA WHAT IT REALLY MEANT TO BE A PRIEST OR IF THE CHURCH WOULD EVEN ACCEPT ME. ALL I KNEW WAS THAT IT BROKE MY HEART TO THINK OF CONGREGATIONS THAT WEREN'T ABLE TO CELEBRATE COMMUNION.

SO, I OFFERED TO START THE DISCERNMENT PROCESS TO SEE WHERE THE CHURCH THOUGHT GOD MIGHT BE CALLING ME. THE DISCERNMENT PROCESS ITSELF WAS A WONDERFUL EXPERIENCE – BEING ABLE TO TALK WITH OTHER FAITHFUL PEOPLE AND REFLECT ON HOW GOD HAS WORKED IN MY LIFE.

ONE BIG CONCERN FOLKS HAVE IS WITH THE EDUCATION REQUIREMENT. WHILE IT IS SOMETHING THAT HAS TO BE DONE (AND IT'S SIMPLY AMAZING TO LEARN ABOUT THE FAITH!), IT'S ALSO SOMETHING THAT'S BECOME REALLY FLEXIBLE THE LAST FEW YEARS. SO, PLEASE CONSIDER DISCERNING WHETHER GOD MIGHT BE CALLING YOU TO SERVE THE CHURCH IN OTHER WAYS. AND GOD BLESS EVERY ONE OF YOU AND THE WORK YOU DO FOR OUR PARISHES!

- 1. Outreach donations were approved for Chenango Co. Hospice for September and Mom's House for October. Outreach for June, July and August were Every Dog's Dream, Danielle House, and Crime Victims of Binghamton respectfully.
- 2. A new dehumidifier has been purchased for the sacristy.
- 3. St. Ann's has helped the Afton Glenwood Cemetery Association with their solicitation mailing. Many thanks to Carol Tarvin and Betty Vail for their help with this project.
- 4. Changes on approved deposit account signatories and Safe Deposit box access were approved.
- 5. November 6th. was approved as Stewardship Sunday.

Be Still Mark Pelesh

Refrain from anger, leave rage alone; Do not fret yourself; it only leads to evil. Psalm 37:9

I'm hardly the first to notice how much anger and rage there is in our public life and how, sadly, it even creeps into our personal dealings. Imagine if the counsel of Psalm 37:9 was followed. It would undermine most campaigns for public office and destroy the business model of the cable news channels! Lest we dismiss this passage on the grounds that the more pastoral society of the Bible doesn't speak to the circumstances of our time, remember that this is from what was traditionally known as the *Psalter of David*. And David had ample reasons for fear, anger, and rage. Among other things, he had to flee into exile when King Saul turned on him, and his own son, Absalom, rose up in rebellion against him. Indeed, psalm after psalm excoriates his "evildoer" enemies and cries out to the Lord for protection.

Despite all this, the psalmist realizes that worry, anger, and rage lead only to evil. What works instead? Verse 7 of Psalm 37 has the answer: "Be still before the Lord and wait patiently for him." But wait a minute -- be still? We're Americans. We don't sit back. We must act! If there is a sin that our society recognizes, it is inaction. Yet, a man of action like King David understood that ultimate safety lay with God, and it was crucial to salvation to be still and be patient. As we rush about, consumed with anxiety, reveling in how swamped we are, and full of self-righteous anger toward others, we need to stop, "leave rage alone," and as verse 3 of Psalm 37 advises, "put your trust in the Lord."

O God of peace, who hast taught us that in returning and rest we shall be saved, in quietness and confidence shall be our strength. By the light of thy Spirit lift us, we pray thee, to thy presence, where we may be still and know that thou art God, through Jesus Christ our Lord. Amen.

Who Am I? The Revd. Canon George Stamm

Most of my adult life has been involved with recovering alcoholics/addicts at several treatment facilities. As I got to know the people behind the addiction, I usually found scared, lonely, sad people who had come to the conclusion that they were worthless. To these people, I would tell them who they are: beautiful children of God.

They couldn't see it; probably thought I was some kind of religious nut. But, if they were willing to grapple with my description of them, they would begin to see a glimmer of hope. Then I could tell them they were just like me, and I was just like them and, if we could set aside our preconceived notions and start acting as if we were beautiful children of God, we would be amazed to discover that it is true.

<u>Creation</u> The Very Revd. Dr. Douglas F. Scharf

Have you ever thought about how the act of creation was an act of grace? We did nothing to deserve or earn life, we did not assist God with the creation of the world, it is pure gift! The act of creation is an expression of God's extravagant love. Whether we are catching a glimpse of the rising sun or standing in awe of snowcapped mountains, we are witnessing grace, we are experiencing the underserved and unearned favor and blessing of God. Every step we make and every breath we take remind us -- our very existence is proof of God's grace.

The Church may seem totally obvious as a place where we encounter grace, but I believe there are times — even in church — when we are spiritually unreceptive. It is easy for us to grow so accustomed to the patterns of ministry and congregational life that we lose sight of the deeper spiritual rhythms that undergird what we do. Sharing bread and wine, proclaiming our faith, baptizing in Jesus' Name, reaching out with God's love to those in need — these are sacramental actions that are ultimately expressions of grace, visible signs of God's boundless mercy. The Church is not simply another civic society or social organization; it is an icon of grace, and a visible sign that God is present and active in the world to establish justice and renew all things. It is unfortunate that it seems to proceed so slowly.

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Character: Proverbs 20:11 – "Even children are known by the way they act, whether their conduct is pure and right."




