And then, as part of my (mostly regular) self-discipline, I came across some perfect statements in Joan Chittister's "The Rule of Benedict: A Spirituality for the 21st Century".

For May 2, Joan writes: "To the wise, it seems, life is not a series of events to be controlled. Life is a way of walking through the universe whole and holy."

"There is an Oriental proverb that teaches, 'Take from death before it takes from thee.'

"If we want to have a spiritual life, we will have to concentrate on doing so."

"No one grows simply by doing what someone else forces us to do. We begin to grow when we finally want to grow. All the rigid fathers and demanding mothers and disapproving teachers in the world cannot make up for our own decision to become what we can by doing what we must."

"In failing to respond to God everywhere God is around us, we may lose the power of God that is in us."

"Who of us has not been failed by all the other things besides God - money, status, security, work, people - that we have clung to and been disappointed by in our cleaving? Whose life has not been warped by a series of twisted hopes, the roots of which were sunk in the shale of false promises and empty treasures that could not satisfy? ... We have been loved to life by God, and now we must love God back with our whole lives or forever live a living death." Amen.

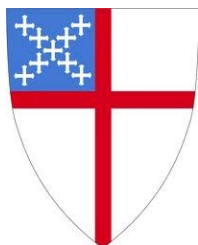

Have you ever wondered why we do this or that in Church?

Bringing the physical into the act of worship

The physical is very significant to human beings. There are lots of questions as to WHY we have this and that in the Church, and why we DO this and that. If these questions aren't answered, they leave little points of frustration which get in the way of our worship. It is very important to say here that these ceremonies (physical acts of worship), objects, symbols, or vestments are not necessary to salvation. The priest could be in shorts, standing stock-still, out in a field, using an orange crate for an altar, ordinary bread, a china cup for a chalice, and the Eucharist would still be as valid as that done with all the ceremony in the finest cathedral. The physical objects are used because we are part physical; and bringing physical beauty and symbolism into our worship makes it seem more reverent, more beautiful, and more meaningful to us.

People occasionally use the term "High Church" and "Low Church." These terms apply chiefly to the amount of ceremony in the worship services of a particular local church. A "high" Episcopal church might regularly use incense, a Sanctus bell, elaborate vestments, processions, and sophisticated music, including chant. All of these things are very beautiful IF the worshiper understands the meaning of everything used and done. Otherwise, physical acts and objects can be distracting and even irritating. The "low" Episcopal church would use little of the above. Most local churches strike a balance. This is particularly true if the church is the only Episcopal church in the vicinity. The same Prayer Book is used throughout the spectrum, the same Faith believed, and the same Sacraments received.

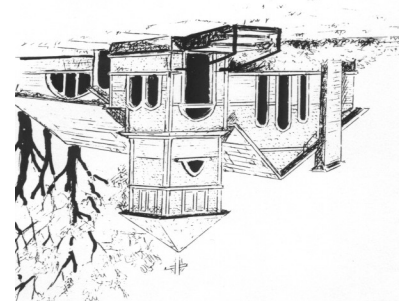

But Stephan, full of the Holy Spirit, gazed steadily upward into heaven and saw the glory of God, and he saw Jesus standing in the place of honor at God's right hand. And he told them, "Look, I see the heavens opened and the Son of Man standing in the place of honor at God's right hand!"

Then they put their hands over their ears, and drowning out his voice with their shouts, they rushed at him. They dragged him out of the city and began to stone him. The official witnesses took off their coats and laid them at the feet of a young man named Saul.

And as they stoned him, Stephen prayed, "Lord Jesus, receive my spirit." And he fell to his knees shouting, "Lord, don't charge them with this sin!" And with that, he died. (NLT)

Acts 7:55-60

The above quoted scripture is the 1st Lesson for the Fifth Sunday of Easter. The following commentary comes from the Guideposts edition of the New Living Translation.

The central message of Christianity, that all have sinned and are lost apart from Christ, is offensive to most people. After all, we humans are proud and we don't like to consider that we are ever in the wrong. Because Christianity is offensive, those who bear its message are perceived as offensive also. Stephen became the first Christian martyr because the Jewish leaders who sent Jesus to the cross were enraged by his ringing accusation of their sin. As believers, we must ask God for the courage to speak the truth and the grace to endure any unjust treatment that may result. When we consider the impact of Stephen's death -- the eventual conversion of the young man Saul (later called Paul) and the spread of the gospel (Acts 8.4) -- we see that even terrible persecution in God's hands can lead to great glory.
