### VESTRY HIGHLIGHTS

- 1. There was discussion on St. Ann's "Angel Tree" program. It was decided to change how this program is handled starting next fall. It was also agreed that St. Ann's would help students who needed clothing items during the school year.
- 2. For outreach, it was voted to send a donation to The Afton Glenwood Cemetery.
- 3. Denise Becker and Tracey Tallmadge were approved as delegates to this year's convention and also to vote on the new Bishop. Alternate delegates will be selected at a later date.
- 4. Reported that the final distribution for the Todd Estate should be made in the next few months. After discussion, it was approved to tithe these funds to the Episcopal Relief and Development organization for use outside of the Parish. It was also suggested that the young people help select some animals to be sent to needy families.
- 5. It was approved to provide St. Ann's usual scholarship of \$200 to a graduating senior at Afton Central School, preferably to go to a student who does not receive other awards.
- 6. The men plan to do the Mother's Day breakfast again this year.
- 7. Treasurer reported that we are solvent and all bills are paid. We apparently will get a quarterly statement, from Zion Greene, itemizing Fr. David's salary and expenses.

#### **A MESSAGE FROM THE BISHOP TRANSITION COMMITTEE OF CNY**

Because of its origins, the Episcopal Church is considered apostolic, as its bishops can be traced back to the original apostles via holy orders. The word "episcopal" refers to government by bishops. The historic episcopate (bishop) continues the work of the first apostles in the Church: guarding the faith, unity and discipline of the Church, and ordaining men and women to continue Christ's ministry. Bishops are also chief priests and pastors and, by their devotion to the people of their jurisdictions, rightly influence the spiritual character of their dioceses.

Bishops in the Episcopal Church are elected by clergy and lay delegates who represent all the people of a diocese. And so it is that, during this particular year, a new bishop will be selected to lead the people of this diocese, from Utica to Waterloo, from the St. Lawrence River to the Pennsylvania frontier. The process for the election of a bishop is not complicated but it is specific so following the plan and schedule is important. Ponder, for example, the wise maidens in Matthew's Gospel, who, unlike their foolish companions, were prepared when the time came. They had not lost sight of the plan and we have the advantage of knowing the schedule!

Parishes need to prepare for the upcoming election. Of course, all required paperwork needs to be kept upto-date, but the focus of this letter is to remind you that Delegates to Convention need to be chosen promptly! *The Delegates from your parish will actually be attending two conventions: the special Electing Convention on August 6<sup>th</sup>, and the annual Diocesan Convention on November 11<sup>th</sup> & 12<sup>th</sup>* and they must be elected by early May. Ms. Debbie Nettle will be sending forms for Delegate certification by mid-April. To be wise and not foolish, you should be prepared to return the forms without delay, so that your parish will be represented at both Conventions, and have a voice in this historic election.

#### The Season of Easter

Easter is full of stories: brave stories of disciples witnessing to their new faith in the risen Jesus; mysterious, wondrous, and challenging stories of an empty tomb and Jesus alive, bringing joy and courage to friends who had denied him, who were fearful and disheartened. "Peace be with you." "I have seen the Lord." "The Lord has risen indeed." "Go therefore and make disciples of all nations"

Early on the first day of the week, Jesus comes to Mary, who at first mistakes him for the gardener. "Mary," he says to her, and she recognizes her risen Lord. Later that day he is a wayfarer opening the scriptures for Cleopas and another disciple who are on their way to the village of Emmaus, where he will be known to them in the breaking of the bread. Then Thomas cannot believe unless he sees and touches the marks of the nails and the wound in Jesus' side. A week later Jesus stands among them and invites Thomas to reach out and touch. "My Lord and my God!" Thomas responds. Several weeks afterward, the disciples are fishing on Lake Galilee (or Tiberias) when, just after daybreak, there is Jesus standing on the beach, though at first they do not recognize him.

There are yet more stories of Jesus' appearing to his disciples. Paul tells of an appearance to more than fire hundred brothers and sisters at once. Sometimes they are frightened and doubting, thinking they may have seen a ghost, before their fears are overcome and they are filled with new hope and joy.

These are, indeed, wondrous and challenging stories in which Jesus is at first often not recognized. But there must have been something in the timbre of his voice. They see his scars. They know him in the breaking of the bread—in the sharing of the bread and wine. The Spirit of Jesus is alive among them! God's love overcomes even the mighty power of death. The disciples can tell his stories again and then eat of the bread and wine with him. They can again tell of the inbreaking kingdom of God and proclaim the Lord Jesus, who now is King of the realm of God's ways. He not only spoke the words of God to them, he himself is God's Word of new life to all people. They have joy to share, a witness to offer, a service to render. Fear and guilt in their lives have been replaced by peace and a new faith, and we now are called to retell their stories and help bring peace, renewed faith, joy, courage, and love to the world.

## **The Final Word**



Then Jesus told him, "you believe because you have seen me. Blessed are those who haven't seen me and believe anyway".

John 20:29

In the Gospel reading for Easter 2, Jesus addresses a human characteristic that I suspect most, if not all, of us experience at one time or another. It is called doubt and it occurs when we do not have enough information to convince us of something. As for Thomas, he was being asked to believe something that was unheard of in his experience. And what does he do? He declares what it will take to assuage his doubts. And what does Jesus do? He offers Thomas the opportunity to do exactly what he had specified would be required to satisfy his doubts. The author of John's Gospel doesn't make it clear whether or not Thomas took Jesus up on his invitation, only that the offer was made.

So where does that leave us? Our doubt may be ok especially if it prompts us to get more information. Regular study of the Scriptures and other Christian literature can have only a positive effect on our spiritual journey. And as we get to know God, Jesus and the Holy Spirit better and better, our doubts will disappear and be replaced by a growing faith that God is always with us and will give us all that we need for living a godly life. What more can we ask?


