

The Season of Pentecost (Ordinary Time)

The season of Pentecost is the season of the Spirit. The Day of Pentecost is the last and crowning day of Easter, but Pentecost also pours forth the Spirit of God and Jesus into the many Sundays and weeks ahead—a period also known as *Ordinary Time*. It is “ordinary” in the sense that it presents no special events in the story of Jesus and his Holy Spirit as do Advent, Christmas, the Epiphany, Good Friday, Easter, and Pentecost. Still, it is a vital season in the life of the church for it is a time of the Spirit’s power to inspire and strengthen Christians for worship, mission, and service.

It is a season to celebrate and give thanks for the creation and all the beauty and other gifts of nature. It is a time for thoughtful and reverend stewardship of creation through its use and care. It is a time to recall the history of God’s people and the ways God’s prophetic promise that “the Holy Spirit, whom the Father will send in my name, will teach you everything, and remind you of all that I have said to you” is fulfilled. (John 14:26)

On the Sundays after Pentecost we recall Jesus’ teaching and hear many of his stories—of surprising dinner parties, the Good Samaritan, lost sheep, a persistent widow, Mary and Martha, a mustard seed, seeds growing secretly, and other times of sowing and harvest. Then there are many stories about Jesus—his healing, forgiveness, and acceptance of lepers, a paralytic, those whom demons had possessed, a foreign woman’s daughter, Bartimaeus, Mary Magdalene, and Zacchaeus.

It is a season for learning about our faith as we discover whether we have eyes that will see and ears that will hear and try our best to follow Jesus and the guidance of his Spirit in the ways of justice, peace, and loving service.

The Standing Committee of the Episcopal Diocese of Central New York is pleased to announce the election of The Very Rev. Dr. DeDe Duncan-Probe as the new bishop of the Diocese. Duncan-Probe currently serves as the Rector of St. Peter's in the Woods Episcopal Church in the Episcopal Diocese of Virginia.

Duncan-Probe was elected on, August 6, 2016 at a Special Convention of the Diocese held at the Holiday Inn in Liverpool, New York. Pending confirmation by a majority of the House of Bishops of The Episcopal Church and by a majority of the Diocesan Standing Committees in the church, she will be consecrated on December 3, 2016.

This statement from the bishop-elect was read at the August 6th, 2016 Election Convention:

My heart is filled with joyful gratitude for God's mercy and grace, and I am humbled to accept the call to serve as your 11th Bishop. Throughout this discernment process I have been inspired, encouraged, and emboldened by your faithful ministry and your sincere dedication to living the gospel of Jesus Christ in service to others. The honor of joining you in ministry is a profound moment, and I am especially mindful of the people God has called us to serve. May the joy and hope of this day become a source of comfort and strength for many people. I want to express my sincere admiration and gratitude to the other candidates, Dena, Debra, Noah, and Nora. Their faithfulness and friendship in this process has been evident and there is no doubt that our church is strengthened by their vibrant ministries. In this time of transition let us hold one another in prayer and prepare our hearts for the ways in which God is calling us forward in faith. Please know you are on my heart and in my prayers as we rejoice in God's ongoing work in our midst.

The Final Word

I myself have gained much joy and comfort from your love, my brother, because your kindness has so often refreshed the hearts of God’s people. Philemon 7

This verse is taken from the Epistle reading for Pentecost 16. You have been hurt by another person—financially, spiritually, personally, or one of many other ways. The wounds you bear run deep. The heartbeat of Paul’s wonderful letter to Philemon is simply this: Please forgive the person who has wronged you. The one who had wronged Philemon was one of his slaves Onesimus. Paul challenges Philemon to forgive Onesimus so completely that he will no longer look at him as a slave but as an equal brother in Christ. This kind of forgiveness was unheard of in the Roman society of that day. But in Christ, it was a new standard, a new expectation. Forgiveness is often a wonderful chain reaction. Christ forgave Paul and made him a new person.

When Paul shared the gospel with Philemon, he accepted Christ, and Christ forgave Philemon. The same happened to Onesimus. Paul forgave Onesimus’s foolish behavior and accepted him as a brother. Now Onesimus and Philemon, both forgiven by Christ and by Paul, must forgive one another. Forgiveness is the very core of Christianity. As Christ has forgiven you of all your sins, so also he expects you to forgive others of their sins against you, and he expects others to forgive you of your sins against them. We must forgive completely, refusing to hold a grudge against anyone. The offense is wiped from our mind, forgiven forever, and we free ourselves and the offender to begin the relationship afresh. This reestablishment of a relationship is known as reconciliation. Paul knew that, in Christ, his friend, Philemon, could see the slave, Onesimus, in a new way—as a fellow believer and member of Christ’s body. When Jesus transforms us, we have no excuse for allowing old differences and arguments to continue. May it be so with us! *From The Touchpoint Bible*
