Greetings and Glory to God our Father!

You may recall my submission for Aug had some of my favorite reflections from a book that I've been reading daily for a few years: *The Rule of Benedict, A Spirituality for the 21<sup>st</sup> Century* by Joan Chittister. It's part of my daily commitment to prayer and reflection and my participation in an Episcopal clergy group, Canterbury Way.

Well, a couple more comments by Chittister have made a very great impression on me this last couple months and I'd like to share them with you.

About the spiritual life, Joan writes, "The person who prays for the presence of God is, ironically, already in the presence of God. The person who seeks God has already found God to some extent. 'We are already counted as God's own,' the Rule reminds us. Benedict knows this and clearly wants us to know it as well. A dull, mundane life stays a dull, mundane life, no matter how intent we become on developing spiritually. No amount of churchgoing will change that. What attention to the spiritual life does change is our appreciation for the presence of God in our dull, mundane lives. We come to realize that we did not find God; God finally got our attention. The spiritual life is a grace

with which we must cooperate, not a prize to be captured or a trophy to be won." p. 7 Later on, Joan continues with this observation: "The difference between Benedict and other spiritual masters of his time lay in the fact that Benedict believed that the spiritual life was not an exercise in spiritual gymnastics. It was to be nothing 'harsh or burdensome.' And it was not a private process. It was to be done in community with others. It was to be a 'school' dedicated to 'the good of all concerned.' It was to be lived with 'patience.'

"The private preserves of the spiritual life are far from dead, however. It is so much easier to go to daily Mass and feel good about it than it is to serve soup at a soup kitchen. It is so much more comfortable to say bedtime prayers than it is to speak peace in a warring world. It is so much more satisfying to contribute to the building of a new church than it is to advocate fair trade over free trade. It is so much more heroic to fast than it is to be patient with a noisy neighbor. It is so much easier to give the handshake of peace in church than it is to speak gently in the family. And yet one without the other is surely fraud if life with God in community is truly of the essence of real spiritual growth." p. 22f Some of what Joan (not to mention St Benedict!) says is not easy to read.

It sometimes shines a bright light on aspects of ourselves that we would rather ignore. And yet, because it's written in hard-earned wisdom and love (and we're usually reading it privately so that the words can resonate in our hearts and our heads) it can really help us make important steps forward in our spiritual journey – individually and (as Joan makes clear) together in community. The spiritual life is also NOT a "one shot and you're done" or a "three strikes and you're out" sort of thing. It's daily reminders and attempts. Daily reflection and action. An ongoing effort to train our attention on God and by doing so, share in the source of life and love. Blessing upon blessing to you all!

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### **God Speaks**

"My sheep listen to my voice; I know them, and they follow me."

Most people believe in God, but they don't expect him to show up at their doorstep or speak to them personally. But if God created the universe and all the life in it, why wouldn't he be able to talk to us too? Surely God can speak. The question is whether he's willing—and whether we're really listening and discerning whether it's his voice we're hearing.

Acts 10 is a fascinating study in how God is able to communicate with people. First, he talked to Cornelius, a God-fearing Roman military leader, through an angel. The angel told Cornelius to end for a man named Peter, who would come and teach him. Then while Cornelius was sending messengers for Peter, God spoke to Peter through a dream, which prepared him to go speak to Cornelius and his family. And while Peter was figuring out the dream, God spoke to him in yet another way, this time directly through the Holy Spirit. He told Peter not to be afraid of the three men at the door looking for him, but to go with them immediately. (Talk about a divine setup!)

So, Peter traveled with the men back to the home of Cornelius and met with Cornelius's family and friends who were assembled there. As Peter explained the gospel to them, the Holy Spirit came upon them in a way that was obvious—and they ended up becoming followers of Jesus just like Peter and his companions.

But that was during Bible times, you might be thinking. Does God speak to us in similar ways today? He certainly can! And he usually speaks to those who, like Cornelius and Peter, turn to him regularly. Even if you struggle with spiritual doubts, you can seek God and ask him to speak to you. Pray the "skeptic's prayer" that the man in Mark 9:24 cried out to Jesus: "I do believe; help me overcome my unbelief!" If you are sincere and really want to hear and follow God, I'm confident he'll find a way to communicate his love and truth to you. It might be through the message of the Bible, the way he usually speaks to us, or it could be in more direct ways through his Spirit; but remember God's Spirit will always agree with God's Word, the Bible.

Jesus said in today's verse that his sheep listen to his voice; he knows them, and they follow him. Will you listen for his voice today? He wants to guide and encourage you!



Giving: The Lord also told Moses, "Say this to the Levites: "When you receive the tithes from the Israelites, give a tenth of the tithes you receive—a tithe of the tithe—to the Lord as a gift." Numbers 18 25-26

"Giving to God never ends. As the Levites received money to support themselves for God's work, so they also were to give money to God. "Tithe of the tithe' is a powerful concept. We give as we have received; we share as others have shared with us. Think of the strength that lies in such a chain of continuous giving. In practicing this principle, everyone is included in giving as well as receiving." NLT - GZ


