I remember it well. Just before the Mother's Day Zoom prayer service began, the thought popped into my head – we're making the Internet sacred!

Ok, maybe I'm overstating it or putting it too simply and I should probably take a step back to explain. One of the more interesting lessons I learned in seminary was what the word "sacred" means. Basically, it just means "set apart for a special purpose". Things like cruets, vestments, patens and chalices and other

things are pretty clear examples of things made sacred by setting them apart for special purposes.

But in that moment before our Mother's Day service began, it occurred to me that we've been setting apart some very different things than we usually do just for the special purpose of continuing to worship together. One important thing that has stayed pretty much the same is the setting aside of a particular time for the special purpose of worshipping together. But we're also setting apart so many other things – laptops, desktops, phones, iPad, etc... And let's not forget the Wi-Fi and Internet connections! These are all being "set aside for a special purpose".

When I got to talking to some of my colleagues about this, it turns out they noticed the same thing. In fact, Fr Steve White told me how he asked his folks why they've chosen the places they've chosen as the place in which they're praying. Now, you don't necessarily need to have any sort of special reason for choosing the place you've chosen to share in our prayer time together, but I'm pretty sure some of you do have special reasons for doing so. Certain places can become sacred by our setting them aside for special purposes. And I invite you to share what the place you've chosen means to you.

But another colleague, Pastor Becky Drebert reflected on how sometimes when we focus attention on sacred things, we can reflexively assume other things are "profane". Becky offered the important reminder that God has made all things and when God saw all the things that God had made, God said they were "very good". So please, don't get caught up in the dichotomy of sacred/profane; rather simply take a moment to notice the new things that are being made sacred. And give thanks. Blessings to you all!



### Outreach for February

The February outreach was originally designated to go to the Episcopal Relief and Development for tornado relief in Nashville, TN. The original check that was sent to the Episcopal Relief and Development was returned with a note that they were not able to use the funds for the purpose we requested. A call to the Cathedral in Nashville was not returned. In researching the Episcopal Churches in Nashville, there are three churches in addition to the Cathedral. Interestingly, one of the churches in Nashville is: St. Ann's Episcopal Church. A call to them resulted in a call back from The Rev. Kira Austin-Young who agreed to accept our contribution and see that it was used to help someone who had suffered tornado damage. The following note was received from Rev. Austin-Young:

### St. Ann's Vestry Synopsi

The vestry meeting was held in a “zoom” format, a first for St. Ann's.

1. **Outreach:** Voted to send the May outreach funds to the Afton United Methodist Church for use in their meal program.
2. The Good Friday and Easter offerings were designated to be divided evenly between The Friends of the Episcopal Diocese of Jerusalem and the Berkley Episcopal Seminary. Due to there being no “church” services for those two days, with a corresponding decrease in offerings, it was decided to add the May outreach amount of \$300 to the offering funds earmarked to those organizations.
3. It is expected that the parking lot “stone and oil” project will be completed in the next month.
4. The format of this year's Diocesan Convention has not been decided at this time.
5. St. Ann's “Exceptional Student” scholarship for an Afton School senior has been approved and the usual letter sent to the High School Office.
6. The annual picnic at Kellystone Campsites has had to be cancelled, due to the pandemic.
7. The Bishop is working on reopening guidelines and they will be communicated to all parishes as soon as they are finalized.
8. A supply of new Prayer Books has been received. **NOTE: They are available, at no cost, to anyone who would like one for home devotions and services. Please call the clerk at: 639-1201 and we will make arrangements to get the book to you.**
9. The “Forward Day by Day” booklets are also available, at no cost, to anyone who would like one. Call the above number.
10. **Financial:** Report was distributed electronically to vestry members. All bills are current, and we are solvent. Thanks be to God. The report was accepted. It was noted that payment has been

received from the Diocese for the Chenango Trust Fund. Fr. David gave a brief explanation of how that trust was originally established.
