November. Honestly, I've struggled for days trying to figure out what to write for November.

As we approach Thanksgiving, it may be incredibly difficult to say what we're thankful for this year. As I write this in late October, our communities have seen spikes in Covid-19 cases. I can't help but wonder (and worry) about what the situation will be when this message goes out to you and as we make our way through November.

But, even before we get to Thanksgiving, many people are afraid of violence surrounding Election Day. Given the fact that the President decided to tell his violent supporters to "stand by" instead of telling them to "stand down" is, to put it mildly, quite worrisome.

Through my days of struggling with trying to imagine what November will bring, the one thing I've found comfort in is the readings for daily Morning Prayer. The wisdom texts of Ecclesiasticus (not to be confused with Ecclesiastes, by the way) and especially the Psalm readings have been healthy reminders that this is God's world and God will have God's justice made manifest.

We are living through very troubled times, no doubt about it. But this world comes from a loving, life-giving, creator God. We know this, and can be certain of it, because we know Jesus Christ who has given us the perfect expression of God's will for God's creation – healing, feeding and forgiving; life-giving love for all of God's creation.

As followers of Christ, we have our role to play, but we also know that God will have God's way – the way of love. Many are tempted to think we are living in the "End Times". All I can say for certain is that this is a very troubled time. But if you are thinking this is the "End Times" then please remember what that really means: heaven will be joined to earth, justice will prevail, the nations of the earth will be fed and healed and live in peace and harmony. God will have God's way of love made manifest in all of God's creation. Amen. And Alleluia!

(1) Any of the four biographical books of the New Testament (Matthew, Mark, Luke, or John) which recount the life and works of Jesus Christ. (2) A passage read in a service from one of these books is called the Gospel Lesson.

**GOSPEL SIDE** - The left side of the sanctuary as the congregation faces it; the side to the clergyman's right. The right is the side of the highest honor and from which the Gospel is read. Also known as the Gospel Horn.

Eight new choir robes are currently needed due to the addition of several new members and to the deterioration of some older ones.

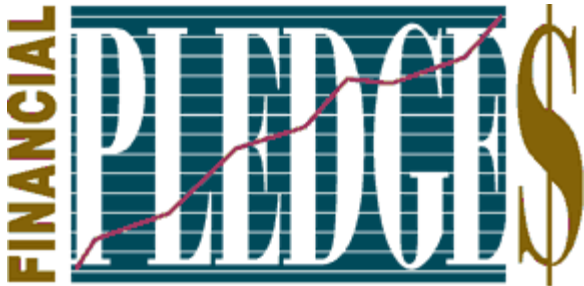

## Dying for Hope

From "The Case for Christ" by Lee Strobel

"People in many nations appear to be searching with a new intensity for spiritual moorings," observed pollster George Gallup. "One of the key factors prompting this search is certainly a need for hope in these troubled times."

Can't you feel it? With the increase in violence, terrorism, conflict, and economic uncertainty, there seems to be a corresponding increase in hunger for hope. "What does it all mean?" people wonder. "Isn't there more to life than just getting by and hoping things won't blow up?"

But there is good news: God offers a hope so powerful it can transform a person's life and future. But it's not the kind of hope we usually think about. Much of what we call "hope" falls into three categories: *Wishful thinking, blind optimism, and hopeful dreams.*

**Wishful Thinking:** Wishful thinking is trying to change reality with our thoughts. We blow out the candles on our birthday cake and say, "I hope I stay healthy for another year." It's the superstitious feeling that maybe, somehow, some way, our sincere desires will help things go the direction we want them to, even though we really don't have any power to make that happen.

**Blind Optimism:** Another hopeful attitude we commonly see is blind optimism. It's good to have a positive outlook, but some optimists paper over their problems as if those problems don't exist: they avert their eyes from the ugly aspects of the world; they act as if, for them, everything will be fine all the time. This might seem admirable, but, again, it doesn't change reality.

**Hopeful Dreams:** Hopeful dreams are lofty goals we set out to achieve. The problem is that these are restricted by our limitations. We could fantasize about becoming the next big NBA star, but that wouldn't change the fact that our vertical leap is measured in millimeters! We can dream all we want, but it's just not going to happen. Our earnest belief in our dreams does not guarantee they'll ever become reality. Thankfully, God offers us something greater than any of these.

**Biblical Hope:** Biblical hope is the confident expectation that God will fulfill his promises to those who trust in Him. The apostle Peter wrote, "In (God's) great mercy he has given us new birth into a living hope through the resurrection of Jesus Christ from the dead, and into an inheritance that can never perish, spoil or fade. This inheritance is kept in heaven for us."

*People are dying for hope. Fortunately, Jesus died to give us hope—the kind "that can never perish, spoil or fade." It's available to everyone; we need to spread the Good News!*

**Leadership:** 2 Chronicles 32:20 – “Then King Hezekiah and the prophet Isaiah son of Amoz cried out in prayer to God in heaven.”

The great occupational hazard of leaders is the trap of believing their own press clippings. When leaders begin to believe that they need no guidance or second opinions, they become vulnerable to arrogance and ego. In this instance, Hezekiah shows sensible leadership in calling upon both a spiritual adviser (Isaiah) and the God of heaven. Whatever leadership responsibilities you may have, you will benefit from regular prayer as well as from the help of wise and sirtual counselors. NLT-GEZ

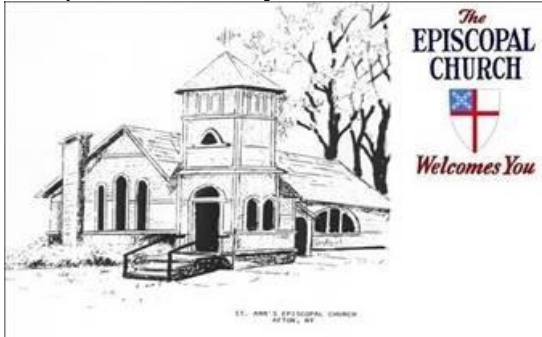
