CHURCH TERMS: Surplice - a very common white vestment worn by a minister over a liturgical undergarment called the cassock. It extends in length at least to the minister's knees and falls freely about his person. The seasonal stole is placed over the surplice.

Stole - A narrow band of silk or brocade in the various liturgical colors appropriate for the respective seasons of the Church Year. Usually decorated with embroidered symbols. It is worn over the shoulders of the minister.

Audrey Hepburn's beauty secrets

udrey Hepburn (1929-1993), the engaging British actress who starred in movies like My Fair Lady and Roman Holiday, was also famed for her humanitarian activities as a Goodwill Ambassador for UNICEF. She narrated children's radio programs for UNICEF, and she went on a UNICEF mission to Ethiopia to bring food for starving Ethiopian children.

Hepburn wrote this poem, which was read at her funeral:

"To have attractive lips, say kind words. To have beautiful eyes, look at what people have beautiful in them. To stay



in them. To stay Audrey Hepburn thin, share the meal with those who are hungry. To have beautiful hair, let a child run his hand through your hair every day.

"To have a good expectation, to go knowing that you are never alone, but together with those who love you and have loved you. People, even more than objects, must be repaired, pampered, revived, reclaimed and saved: never reject anyone.

"Think about it: If you ever need a helping hand, you'll find one at the end of every arm. As you grow older, you will realize that you have two hands, one to help yourself, the other to help those who need it.

"A woman's beauty is not in the clothes she wears, her face or the way she does her hair. The beauty of a woman is seen in her eyes, because they are the open door to her heart, the source of her love.

"The beauty of a woman is not in her makeup, but in the true beauty of her soul. It is the tenderness it gives, the love, the passion it expresses. A woman's beauty develops with the years."




