From Fr. David

As I sit to write this, I have no idea what December will bring us. In fact, every time I sit to write these letters, I have no idea what the month in question will bring. But that fact is raised to the nth degree this month. I was recently reminded, since I honestly forgot, that the Mayan calendar is telling us things will "come to an end" December 21st and a new age will begin.

What is most striking to me is that for most of the history of Christianity, Christians have used the very same sort of language. You see, from that first Easter morning, it's been part of the Christian worldview that a new age has begun. The slogan that's usually bandied about is "almost, not yet". That is, with Christ's resurrection, the general resurrection, the return of God to set things right has begun, but it's completion has not happened yet.

We have always lived in an "in between" time. All around us, if we look hard enough, we can see evidence of God's breaking into this world to heal it. Sometimes we have to look a bit harder than at other times, but it's there. The evidence of God's work in the world is always around us, waiting to be witnessed; waiting to be accepted.

Our three parishes have been working hard to witness to God's plans for us - God's plan of healing and health for us. The most clear example is with the family/youth group. Parents and kids from the three parishes have been meeting and getting to know each other over the past few months. That's about to take an important turn. Beginning in **January**, we will have group meetings on the **3d Sunday of every month** from **2 pm - 4 pm**. Our first official meeting will be at **Zion**, **January 20th from 2 pm - 4 pm**. More information will follow.

And speaking of providing more information - we've started a facebook page dedicated to the cooperative effort of the three parishes! It's name is Southern Chenango Episcopal Churches. Please, look it up and "Like" it!

I'm coming to believe more and more that the old truism that "there's no such thing as an individual Christian" is also true of our parishes. No single Christian, not even those hallowed Desert Fathers and Mothers (the hermits of the early Church), has ever been able to do this on their own. There's a fundamental flaw in the arrogance which thinks that one person *can* draw closer to God *without* their brothers and sisters. I'm beginning to see that the same basic lesson applies to our parishes as well.

So, as we prepare to celebrate the birth of our Lord (that IS what we're doing at Christmas, right folks??), let us also be mindful of our brothers and sisters in Christ - without whom we simply cannot be who we have pledged ourselves to be.

Advent Hope

We live in a world in which "bigger and better" define our expectations for much of life. We have become so enamored by super-size, super-stars, and high-definition that we tend to overlook small things and their potential. But through out the Scriptures, we find God usually works with small beginnings and impossible situations. Most of the Biblical heroes are frail and imperfect:

- § Abraham, the coward who cannot believe the promise;
- § Jacob, the cheat who struggles with everybody;
- *§* Joseph, the immature and arrogant teen;
- § Moses, the impatient murderer who cannot wait for God;
- § Gideon, the cowardly Baal-worshiper;
- § Samson, the womanizing drunk;
- § David, the power-abusing adulterer;
- *§* Solomon, the unwise wise man;
- § Hezekiah, the reforming king who could not quite go far enough;
- § A very young Jewish girl from a small village in a remote corner of a great empire.

If God used all of them for such great work, it is likely that God is able to use us, inadequate, unwise, and too often lacking in faith. We best not, in self-righteousness, put limits on what God can do with the smallest things, the most unlikely of people, the most hopeless of circumstances. Listen to young children, recite the words of Handel's Messiah, look to the leaves falling in the crisp morning light – this is the wonder of Advent. While many today talk about the death of Jesus and the atonement of sins, the early Church celebrated the Resurrection and the hope it embodied. Advent is a time of expectation for the Incarnation and Christ's return in glory – a past and future orientation filled with hope!

Those who have suffered and still hope understand more about God and about life than those who have not suffered. Maybe that is what hope is about: a way to live, not just to survive, and to live authentically amidst all life's problems with a faith that continues to see possibility simply because God is God.

May our Advent be filled with wonder and hope.

Joyfully Aging book calls us to be "amazing grays"

The following are excerpts from an inspirational and quotable book by Dr. Richard Bimler on the art of *Joyfully Aging*.

My new book is about celebrating God's gift of aging, instead of moaning and complaining about old age. It is about seeing aging as a gift and a blessing. For me, as it has no doubt been for you, life has been a roller coaster ride of Good Fridays and Easters, all mixed together. Just like you, I have experienced many low and dark times throughout my years, as well as many high and light-hearted times.

We live in a culture that still honors and worships youth. People still want to look youthful, smell youthful, and talk youthful. But why sweat the wrinkles? Even as you age, why not work at being the most joy-filled person in your neighborhood? We can affirm life as a gift from God despite all of our worries and woes and wrinkles and whining. We can celebrate Christ's presence within us each new day. Throughout Scripture, we do not hear much about people of different ages sitting or standing and talking about aging. We read about older folks such as Abraham, Anna, and Noah, and on and on, who went about serving the Lord and celebrating the Lord's presence in their lives. There is no such thing as retiring on this side of Heaven. We leave jobs, and we transition between places and people, but we never retire. It is not a concept shared in the Scriptures. Scripture talks about people transitioning from one role to another—of serving as a mentor or coach to younger people.

The story we have to tell of Jesus Christ is a story of love and forgiveness and joy. Older adults are called to be encouragers, affirmers, and cheerleaders in the Lord. The older I become, the more convinced I am that the three most significant priorities we older adults can have is to encourage, encourage, encourage!!

The four W's of growing old gracefully: wit, wisdom, wrinkles, and wow. We have a built-in "wow" detector because we know we live on this side of the resurrection. With this realization, we can look at life through the cross and resurrection, instead of evaluating it by whether we are in good health or well-off financially.

Laughter and aging go together like a horse and carriage. The older we get the more we become aware of the incongruities of life; therefore, older people are more able to laugh and chuckle about their weaknesses, failures, and even disappointments. We learn to laugh at ourselves more. It becomes a daily "holy habit" for many of us. So, people of God, lighten up! Our smiles and grins and even guffaws shine out to others around us.

The Final Word



Do not worry about anything; but in everything by prayer and supplication with thanksgiving let your requests be made known to God. And the peace of God, which surpasses all understanding, will guard your hearts and your minds in Christ Jesus. Philippians 4:6-7

This seems to be excellent advice for us as we embark on the season of Advent with its air of anticipation, expectation and contemplation. With all the hype to decorate, buy countless gifts, attend loud, boisterous parties and prepare extravagant meals, how many of us can say that we are at peace and, if we are not, how might we experience that peace?

I would suggest that it involves setting priorities, or, in the words of our Presiding Bishop (PB,) "making some conscious decisions about how to spend your Advent time this year." Granted, there's lots to be done in the brief four weeks until Christmas but how much of it is essential?

If it's important to us we can all find 10 minutes a day in all of our busy-ness, pick a quiet place and spend part of it talking to God and the rest of it listening for His answers. Again, our PB suggests giving thanks for our various blessings. Or you might read the Scripture selections for the coming Sunday and let them speak to you. If you absolutely cannot find time to do this, try praying, praising and thanking God as you are falling asleep each night. I've found it's a great way to end the day and might even help you fall asleep! What better way to get away from the pressure of the secular world? Why not give it a try?

Our society emphasizes caring for our physical and mental health and this is good to a point. But what about our spiritual health? Paul tells us to not worry about anything but rather to pray. How are we doing with that? In computer programming a common acronym is: GIGO which stands for "Garbage In Garbage Out." Our spirit is much the same as a computer. What we get out of it depends on what we put in. How are you caring for your spirit? Now is a perfect time to do something for it! God's peace be with you.
