## Fr. Ralph's Musings

Well, Christmas is over. To the secular world this may be a truism. In fact, for the fourteen years we celebrated Christmas in Wellsville, there was a family that had their tree at the curb by 9:00 a.m. on December 26. This was not a mistake, it was an annual event. I can only surmise that to them Christmas ended with the receiving of gifts and the frenzied shredding of wrapping paper.

For people of faith, Christmas is **NOT** over. Christmas Day is only the beginning of the remembrance of Jesus' birth. Christmas is a twelve day season which begins in the stable, which recalls his Jewish naming ceremony and circumcision on the eighth day, and culminates with the coming of the Three Wise Men on the feast of the Epiphany. This is part of our Anglican heritage and is reflected in song by the English carol, "The Twelve Days of Christmas," (although I have never been personally been turned on by a partridge in a pear tree).

In parts of Europe and in the Orthodox churches, Epiphany is more important than Christmas and is the day set aside for the giving of gifts in remembrance of Magi's offerings to the infant Jesus of gold, frankincense and myrrh. These were not random gifts. Each had great meaning. Gold was a gift for a king. Frankincense was for a priest. Myrrh was used to prepare a body for burial, a grim omen of Jesus' coming sacrifice for our salvation. And our response to Jesus' gift to us must be a continual return of that love he showed on the cross. Then Christmas goes beyond twelve days. It becomes a yearround thanksgiving to a God that loves us so much that he died for our salvation.

Think about it. Above all, try it; you'll like it.



## The Final Word

#### (This is a reprise of a commentary that was written for the Jan. 2006 issue. It seems appropriate to republish it.)

**Epiphany** - 1. A feast celebrated Jan. 6th, commemorating the coming of the Magi as being the first manifestation of Jesus Christ to the Gentiles..

**manifestation**—an act of being evident to the senses, especially to the sight.

As Christians we believe that God became manifest in the person of Jesus Christ. That is, God became visible to people by taking the form of Jesus Christ, calling himself "the Light of the World." And in the beginning of his Gospel, John says, "The light shines through the darkness, and the darkness can never extinguish it." Think about light. It can't be seen unless it is reflected off something, be it a particle of dust or an object like the moon. Furthermore, in the absence of light, we are unable to see and are likely to stumble around, bumping into things and possibly injuring ourselves..

Isn't God much like that? We can see Him only when His love is reflected by others. Likewise, it is only when we live our lives based on God that others will see God in and through us. Without God, we stumble through our lives, running into things and often getting hurt.

With Jesus, the Light of the World, we are able to see, and when we see, we don't get hurt as much!
