Can Christianity Survive?

An aggressive and outspoken segment of modern society is doing everything in its power to destroy Christianity. The first wave is to push it out of the public forum, and the next will undoubtedly be a movement to suppress it altogether. The question is often asked today as to whether Christianity (or religion itself) can survive this onslaught. The answer is simple: Yes!! Through history the Church has faced enemies who have sought to destroy it, and all they have ever accomplished is to strengthen it. Times are changing and the days of easy and socially acceptable Christianity may be on their way out, but the Faith will persist. As Bishop Fulton J. Sheen observed many years ago, we are watching the end of Christendom, but not the end of Christianity. Christianity is that Faith deposited once and for all time with the Apostles. It was given to us by God, and it is for all people. As the rabbi Gamaliel observed two thousand years ago, "if it is of God it cannot be stopped, and if it is not, there is no need to fight it because it will die by itself." (Acts 5:33) Christendom, on the other hand, was that long period when the vast majority of Americans and Europeans claimed to be Christian and the Church was a central focus of daily life. Christmas and Easter, despite their secular overtones, were acknowledged to be the celebrations of the birth and resurrection of Christ and public prayer was commonplace and expected.

The era of Christendom is disappearing and it may be just as well. It was too easy to claim to be a Christian. As a result, we tended to take the faith for granted. People went to church on Sunday because it was what one did on a Sunday morning. Everyone expected it of them. The churches were full, but I wonder how many people, even some clergy, really understood what was going on there. There is a difference between going to church and worshiping God. One is a matter of routine, and the other is a conscious spiritual activity. All too often the twain do not meet.

Perhaps now that Christendom is dying we can get on with the business of Christianity. When we consider that the Church's mission is to bring us to everlasting life, we have to realize that this is serious business. The work of the Church is not to sponsor soup kitchens and promote social justice. These are signs of faith, not its purpose. The work of the Church is to save souls. This requires prayer, an understanding of what the Church teaches, and a willingness to put those teachings into practice. To live up to those expectations requires discipline and a conscious attention to one's spiritual life. It takes very little effort to be a part of Christendom, but to be a Christian is hard work. The Final Word



Christ is the head of the church, which is his body. He is the first of all who will rise from the dead, so he is first in everything. Colossians 1:18

This verse is taken from the Epistle reading for Pentecost 9. The key message of Colossians is that Christ and Christ alone is the head of the church. He is first in everything. As Christians and members of the church, Christ is our head: our spiritual source of life, our guide, counselor, even our spiritual identity.

The Christians at Colosse had begun to debate this truth. They had acknowledged Christ as Savior, but they began to sample other things, as many do today. Drifting away from Christ the head, the Colossians lost their identity with him. They could have easily fit into today's society.

But Christ is not merely an important part of our new life, he is our new life, the reason for all we do. When Christ is truly our head, others recognize us as Christians.

If you have received Christ, Paul told the Colossians, then walk with him and be rooted in him by knowing his Word and obeying it. This is accomplished by letting God's Word constantly live in you. To become a Christian is to take on a new life in Christ, dropping the old life. If the old sinful way of life dies, then your desire to sin should die too.

Christians are endangered today, not from without as much as from within. Having acknowledged Christ and then given in to materialism, selfcenteredness, or a preoccupation with other things, we lose spiritual sensitivity to our head, Jesus Christ. To be truly Christian, we must let the Word of God dwell richly in us, allowing Christ to be most important in our lives. **From the Guideposts TouchPoint Bible.** Ed.
